RODGERS AND HAMMERSTEIN

Why are Rodgers and Hammerstein so important in Musical Theatre? When Oklahoma opened in 1943, it broke the traditional conventions of the musical, just as Showboat had 16 years previously. There were no high kicking chorus girls when the show started but offstage, a baritone began to sing "Oh what a beautiful morning" unaccompanied. Rodgers and Hammerstein supported the conviction that the song was the servant of the play. "Oh what a beautiful mornin" was the first lyric Hammerstein wrote for the show. Rodgers recalls, "When Oscar handed it to me I was a little sick with joy because it was so lovely and so right. When you're given words like, 'The corn is a high as an Elephant's eye', you've got to say something musically."

The shows of Rodgers and Hammerstein were the product of sincerity. Hammerstein particularly embraced life's simple truth and communicated that truth in words, characters and situations. He really did believe that love conquers all, that virtue triumphs and that dreams do come true.

Pam Stanney

(Aunt Eller) has performed in plays and musicals over many years. She has performed in such diverse roles as Mercedes in Carmen, Madam Acartie in Blyth Spirit, Katrina in Mikado and Queenie in Show Boat. She recently had great success in the BT sponsored play Happy Families by John Godber for the Little Theatre Guild. She makes a welcome return to CMP for this production.

Jon Ranwell

(Curly) has been involved on the stage for the last ten years. He has had many roles including Kipps in *Half a Sixpence*, Cornelius in *Hello Dolly* and Orpheus in *Orpheus in the Underworld*. Having been encouraged by being invited to audition for *Aspects of Love* 18 months ago Jon is hoping to go to drama college and turn professional. This is his first performance with CMP.

Juliet Clarke
